- j. 1045 – Injured person
  - i. Different from 1053? How?
  - ii. Are you injured if you are shot?
  - iii. What is the difference?
- k. 1046 – Sick person
  - i. When would we use this?
  - ii. What’s the difference between 1046 and 1045?
- l. 1053EMS – Person down (police, fire, and medical needed)
  - i. Injuries are known or suspected
  - ii. Someone is bleeding
  - iii. Send protocol should be included
- m. 1053PD – Person down (pd only)
  - i. Injuries are unknown or not suspected
  - ii. No obvious bleeding
- n. 1054 – Possible dead body
  - i. A report of a possible dead body without official pronouncement
  - ii. Reason to believe they are deceased
  - iii. Known medical problems/history
  - iv. 1053EMS vs 1054?
- o. 1055 – Coroner’s case
  - i. A deceased person confirmed by medical personnel
- p. 1056 – Suicide
  - i. Usually a clearing code, 1056A first if they go 1055 then it can be changed to 1056
- q. 1056A – Attempted suicide
  - i. Person did something to attempt to kill themselves.
  - ii. Methods can be by pills, wrist slash, other cutting, pistol, shotgun, hanging, overdose of medications, asphyxiation, carbon monoxide, etc.
- r. 1057 – Firearms discharged
  - i. Usually heard by caller
- s. 1058 – Garbage complaint
  - i. Usually handled by code enforcement
  - ii. PD can go if in progress, on weekends or holidays or after hours with Sergeant approval
- t. 1062 – Meet the citizen
  - i. Citizen calls and asks to speak with an officer in person and they currently have no emergency
  - ii. Who would want this?

- u. 1065 – Missing person
  - i. Is there a minimum time frame where a reporting party will have to wait before calling the police to make a 1065 report?
- v. 1065F – Found missing person
  - i. If they are found, they are not missing anymore, and we should be cancelling the 1065 1050 on them
- w. 1065J – Missing male juvenile
  - i. Under age 18
  - ii. Mandatory response if age 11 or under
- x. 1065JX – Missing female juvenile
  - i. Under age 18
  - ii. Mandatory response if age 11 or under
- y. 1065MH – Missing person, mentally handicapped
  - i. Basic rule here is however slight the handicap we will always dispatch an officer for a 1065MH at any age
- z. 1065X – Missing adult female
- aa. 1066 – Suspicious person
  - i. Anyone can be a 1066 based on actions or appearance to the caller. The caller is aware of their area and are usually have good intent when calling
- bb. 1066P – Suspicious package
  - i. [REDACTED]
  - ii. Anything left unattended at airport could be a 1066P
- cc. 1066W – Suspicious person with a weapon
  - i. A person acting in a suspicious manner and is carrying some type of weapon, but no disturbance is occurring
  - ii. It can be any type of weapon: gun, knife, rake, baseball bat, chain, stick, pole or anything that could be used as a weapon
- dd. 1066X – Suspicious female
- ee. 1067 – Person calling for help
- ff. 1067X – Female calling for help
- gg. 1070 – Prowler
  - i. A person seen or heard around a residence or building, who is not actively trying to enter it
- hh. 1071 – Person shot
  - i. Combined event
- ii. 1072 – Person stabbed
  - i. Combined event
- jj. 1080 – Explosion
  - i. Fire does not respond unless flames or smoke are seen
- kk. 1087 – Meet the officer
  - i. Rendezvous for some reason
  - ii. Internal SJPDP or with allied agency
- ll. Animal complaints
  - i. 1091 – Animal complaint
  - ii. 1091A – Vicious animal
  - iii. 1091B – Noisy animal

- iv. 1091C – Injured animal
- v. 1091D – Dead animal
- vi. 1091H – Stray horse
- mm. Pedestrian stops
  - i. 1095 – Pedestrian stop
  - ii. 1095X – Pedestrian stop, female
  - iii. 1096 – Pedestrian stop send fill code 3
  - iv. 1096X – pedestrian stop, female send fill code 3
- nn. 1124 – Abandoned vehicle
  - i. Check plate for status. Is it 10851?
  - ii. Abandoned vehicle hotline
- oo. 1126 – Abandoned or found bicycle
  - i. Where is the rider? Could this be something else?
  - ii. Referred to DOT
- pp. 1154 – Suspicious vehicle
  - i. Remember that any vehicle can be suspicious to the person calling
- qq. Vehicle accidents
  - i. 1179 – Vehicle accident ambulance enroute
    - 1. Accident with injuries
    - 2. Number of vehicles and patients
    - 3. Combined event
    - 4. When in doubt send them out
  - ii. 1180 – Vehicle accident major injuries
    - 1. Officer will advise us to change an 1179 to an 1180 or 1181
  - iii. 1181 – Vehicle accident minor injuries
    - 1. Used when injuries present and EMS refused
  - iv. 1182 – Vehicle accident no injuries
    - 1. Caller advised no injuries
  - v. 1183 – Vehicle accident unknown injuries
    - 1. Caller is unable to determine if an ambulance is required
    - 2. Who goes on this one?
- rr. 1184 – Traffic control
- ss. Vehicle stops
  - i. 1195 – Vehicle stop
  - ii. 1195X – vehicle stop, female
  - iii. 1196 – Vehicle stop, send fill code 3
  - iv. 1196X – Vehicle stop, female send fill code 3
- tt. 148 – Resisting arrest
- uu. 187 – Murder
  - i. Closing code
- vv. 207 – Kidnapping
  - i. Every person who forcibly, or by other means of instilling fear, steals or takes, or holds, detains or arrests any person in this state and carries the person to another country, state or county or into another part of the same county is guilty of kidnapping
- ww. Robbery

- i. Robbery is the felonious taking of personal property in the possession of another, from his person or immediate presence and against his will, accomplished by mean of force or fear.
  - ii. 211A – Armed robbery
  - iii. 211PS – Purse snatch robbery
  - iv. 211SA – Strong armed robbery
- xx. 215 – Carjacking
  - i. Felonious taking of a motor vehicle in the possession of another or his or her immediate presence against his or her will and with the intent to either permanently or temporarily deprive the person of the motor vehicle accomplished by means of force or fear.
- yy. 220 – Assault with intent to commit felony sex crime
  - i. Assault with intent to commit mayhem, rape, sodomy, oral copulation, or other specified offense and commission of same acts in course of burglary of first degree
- zz. 236 – False imprisonment
  - i. The unlawful violation of the personal liberty of another
- aaa. 240 – Assault
  - i. An assault is the unlawful attempt, coupled with a present ability, to commit a violent injury on the person of another
- bbb. 241 – Assault on an officer
- ccc. 242 – Battery
  - i. A battery is any willful and unlawful use of force or violence upon the person of another
- ddd. 240242 – Assault and battery
- eee. 243 – Battery on an officer
- fff. 245 – Assault with a deadly weapon
  - i. Any person who commits an assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument likely to produce great bodily injury
- ggg. 246 – Shooting into an occupied vehicle or dwelling
- hhh. 261 – Rape
  - i. Rape is an act of sexual intercourse accomplished with a person including the spouse of the perpetrator under the following circumstances
    1. Mental disorder or developmental or physical disability unable to give legal consent and this known to the perpetrator
    2. By force, violence, duress, menace or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury on the person
    3. Prevented from resisting by use of intoxicating or anesthetic substance, controlled substance
    4. Due to perpetrator fraud
    5. Unconscious of the nature of the act due to sleep, not aware, knowing or perceiving or cognizant that the act occurred
    6. Victim believes perpetrators is the spouse
    7. Threats to retaliate in the future

- 8. Threatening to incarcerate the victim believing perpetrator is public official
- iii. 261.5 – Illegal intercourse
  - i. Not the spouse of and one person is over 18 and the other is a minor
    - 1. Less than 3 years difference = misdemeanor
    - 2. More than 3 years difference = felony
- jjj. 270 – Child Neglect
  - i. Parent of a child willfully omits, without lawful excuse to furnish necessary clothing, food, shelter or medical attendance to child
- kkk. 273A – Child abuse
  - i. Any person who under circumstances or conditions likely to produce great bodily harm or death, willfully causes or permits any child to suffer or inflicts unjustifiable pain or mental suffering
- lll. 273D – Child beating
  - i. Any person who willfully inflicts upon a child any cruel or unusual inhuman corporal punishment or injury resulting in a traumatic condition
- mmm. 273.5 – Spousal battery
  - i. Any person who willfully inflicts upon a person who is his or her spouse, former spouse, cohabitant, former cohabitant, or the mother or father of his or her child, injury resulting in a traumatic condition is guilty of a felony
- nnn. 277 – Child stealing
  - i. Every person not having right to custody who maliciously takes, entices away, keeps, withholds or conceals any child with intent to keep that child from a lawful custodian
- ooo. 288 – Sexual offenses under 14 years
  - i. Any person who willfully and lewdly commits any lewd or lascivious act upon a person who is under the age of 14 years with intent of arousing, gratifying the lust or sexual desires of that person or the child
- ppp. 290 – Registration of sex offender
  - i. Will often be referred to as 290REG
- qqq. 314 – Indecent Exposure
  - i. Exposes his or her person, or the private parts thereof in any public place, or in any place where there are present other persons to be offended or annoyed
- rrr. 368 – Elder/dependent abuse
  - i. Infliction of pain or mental suffering or endangering health; theft or embezzlement of property
- sss. 3056 – Parole violation
- ttt. Disturbances
  - i. 415 – Disturbance
  - ii. 415A – Disturbance, fight
  - iii. 415F – Disturbance, family
  - iv. 415FC – Disturbance, fire crackers
  - v. 415G – Disturbance, gang

- vi. 415J – Disturbance, juvenile
- vii. 415M – Disturbance, music
- viii. 415MC – Disturbance, motorcycle
- ix. 415N – Disturbance, neighbor

  - i. Any person who willfully threatens to commit a crime which will result in death or great bodily injury to another person
- www. 422.6 – Hate crimes
- xxx. 451 – Arson
  - i. Willful and malicious causing a fire or burns to person, property, structure or land
- yyy. 4532 – Escape
  - i. From any custodial location
- zzz. 459 – Burglary
  - i. Every person who enters any house, room, apartment, tenement, shop, warehouse, store, mill, barn, stable, outhouse, tent, vessel with the intent to commit grand or petit larceny or any felony is guilty of burglary
- aaaa. 459R – Burglary report
  - i. Cold 459, report needed
- bbbb. 459VEH – Vehicle burglary
- cccc. 470 – Forgery
  - i. Intent to defraud, knowing that he or she has no authority to do so, signs the name of another person or fictitious person to, or alters any items listed in subsection
- dddd. 476A – Bad checks
  - i. Person writing checks knowing that the account has no funds
- eeee. Thefts
  - i. 484 – Theft
  - ii. 484BOL – Theft be on the lookout
  - iii. 484R – Theft of recyclables
  - iv. 487 – Grand theft
  - v. 488 – Petty theft
- ffff. 496 – Receive or possession of stolen property
  - i. Every person who buys or receives stolen property knowing the property to be stolen
- gggg. 503 – Embezzlement
  - i. Embezzlement is the fraudulent appropriation of property by a person to whom it was entrusted
- hhhh. 518 – Extortion
  - i. Obtaining of property from another, with his consent, or the obtaining an official act of a public officer, induced by wrongful use of force or fear or under color of authority

mmmm.	601T – Truant <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Truancy Abatement Burglary Suppression</li> <li>ii. TABS event</li> <li>iii. Referred to TABS center</li> </ul>
nnnn.	601W&I <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Uncontrollable juvenile</li> <li>ii. Maybe or become ward of the court</li> </ul>
oooo.	602PC – Trespassing <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Willfully commits a trespass</li> </ul>
pppp.	602WI – Juvenile violating a court order
qqqq.	646.9 – Stalking <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Any person who willfully and maliciously and repeatedly follows or harasses another person and who makes a credible threat with intent to place that person in reasonable fear for their safety</li> </ul>
rrrr.	647 – Vagrant <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Loiters or wanders upon the streets or from place to place without apparent reason or business</li> </ul>
ssss.	647A – Soliciting for lewd conduct <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>i. Solicits anyone to engage in lewd or dissolute conduct in any public place</li> </ul>
tttt.	647B – Soliciting for prostitution
uuuu.	647F – Drunk in public
vvvv.	647.6 – Molest/annoy child under 18 years

  - ii. FDAID – Code 1

- lllll. FILL – Fill request unspecified code of response
- mmmmm. FILL1 – Fill request code 1
- nnnnn. FILL3 – Fill request code 3
- ooooo. FNDPRP – Found property
- ppppp. HOSTAGE – Hostage situation
- qqqqq. INFO – Information event
  - i. Event for information only, no response need
- rrrrr. MOCK211 – Stimulated robbery
  - i. Training purposes
  - ii. Community service
- sssss. MUNI – Municipal code violation
- ttttt. PATCK – Patrol check
  - i. Request for increased patrols due to a request by citizen or as a result of a crime occurrence
- uuuuu. SELSUR – Self surrender
  - i. Usually at PAB lobby, subject with a warrant will turn themselves in
- vvvvv. SNIPER – Sniper event
- wwwww. SUSCIR – Suspicious circumstances
  - i. Catch all type code good for circumstances that don't fall into other categories
- xxxxx. UNKCIR – Unknown circumstances
  - i. Unable to explain or describe what has occurred

- zzzzz. WELCK – Welfare check
  - i. This is a check on a person's welfare or wellbeing.
  - ii. Making sure someone is alive or not being beaten or injured
